> classy, go to your local thrift store and pick up a nice leisure suit.


5. R e m e mber, here in the Gem State, we have a little thing called pride.





MOSUL, IQ-Sunday's national elections in Iraq yielded more than a handful of elected representatives whose task is drafting a Constitution for the Middle Eastern country's burgeoning democracy. The elections also yielded a virulent outbreak of AIDS.
